Rod and I were 14 years old and the Craig 15. It was a week long adventure and Rod had just cut his big toe on a lawnmower a couple days before the hike. We looked at his festering, painfull big toe daily and all he could do was laugh about it. We forded the Waptus River and once we arrived at Lake Ivanhoe and Dutch Miller gap , ended up hiking in snow covered forest for hours zig-zagging back and forth looking for the trail through avalanche strew trees and rubble. Rod was part of one of the greatest adventures of my youth. Ask yourself, would you let your 14 year old hike through the wilderness alone? For Rod and us it was a joy.*
