Ronald A. Kelemen, 68, of Charleston passed away Friday, September 28, 2018 at Hubbard Hospice House, Charleston.

He was born in Charleston to the late Alex and Evelyn Griffith Kelemen.

Ron was a volunteer and advised with “Thanks! Since 2010, when the Rosie the Riveter Park was unveiled. He was a Vietnam veteran (Hospital Corpsman) who helps “Thanks! Include veterans in “Rosie work”. He holds a B.A. degree from Marshall University and a M. A. degree from San Diego State University, both in sociology. He worked for the state of West Virginia in protection of the elderly, children and disadvantaged adults. His interests include American modern history and world history. He was a graduate from Marsh Fork High School.

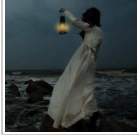

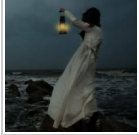

“ Mr. Kelemen was kind enough to let me do for him what was no longer possible for me to feel comfortable doing for my own parents. He spent his last three years attending funerals of various friends and acquaintances, going to St. Albans to sit with a dying friend, frequently driving to "Marmet" on the weekends to visit relatives, and enjoying his weekly Sunday brunch with Ann Montague, his close friend and associate. Otherwise, it seemed to me he was largely engaged in "CSI" and being abused by various people in the medical and pharmaceutical industries. Mr. Kelemen loved "cross" word puzzles, doublespeak, being deliberately vague and ambiguous, and seeing how small he could write things and have them still be legible (under a magnifying glass). In spite of my criticism, he regularly had fast food lunches, always with a diet Pepsi, and smoked Pall Mall cigarettes until the ambulance came to take him to the hospital for the last time. One of the last things he said to me was "I WANT A NEWSPAPER" . His favorite (only) swear word was "shit", which he used frequently; when he could, when he couldn't, when he was being one, or when someone else was being one. He was an avid book collector, and I always felt that Bernie Sanders library was probably remarkably similar to his own. Mr. Kelemen admirably drove a hybrid vehicle, and made monthly monetary donations to several charity organizations. He enjoyed watching Anthony Bourdain, RT, and Jeopardy , and was a Marshall fan. Mr. Kelemen helped me by letting me help him, I viewed him as a loving and occasionally grumpy uncle, but sometimes, he was more like a father. I miss him, but am relieved that he is no longer suffering from the indignities various people in the medical industry visited on him. My condolences to the family. I miss you Mr. Kelemen.
